



## LOUISVILLE METRO CONTINUUM OF CARE 2014 HOMELESS CENSUS

### NUMBER OF HOMELESS PEOPLE

The homeless service providers in Jefferson County, Kentucky, counted 7,380 unduplicated homeless people who were served between January 1, 2014, and December 31, 2014. This represents a 14% decrease in the number of homeless people last year over the year prior, including people who were sheltered (who stayed in emergency or transitional shelter) and unsheltered (who lived only on the streets or in camps). As with each year, the count of the unsheltered homeless is likely an undercount due to the difficulty in counting this population.

### HOMELESS SUBPOPULATION COUNTS

The below numbers apply to all 7,380 homeless people counted in Jefferson County last year. Please note that these subpopulations are not mutually exclusive—e.g., someone could have a disability *and* be a veteran.

Number of homeless families	449	29% decrease from 2013
Number of people in families	1,299	28% decrease from 2013
Number of children (age less than 18, including unaccompanied youth)	1,362	14% increase from 2013
Number of unaccompanied youth	499	11% decrease from 2013
People with disabilities	3,422	1% decrease from 2013
Victims of domestic violence	879	33% decrease from 2013
Chronically homeless	535	**
Veterans	904	1% decrease from 2013

*\*\* The chronic homeless total is an estimate. Chronic data is skewed because new questions were introduced by HUD mid-year. However, these new questions should provide a better picture of chronic homelessness in the future.*

### SHELTER CAPACITY

The shelter capacity is the total number of shelter beds that were available during the reporting period. ES means “emergency shelter,” and TS means “transitional shelter.”
